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How-To Make Felted Wool Dryer Balls

Supplies:

- 1-2 skeins of 100% wool yarn.
- Crochet hook or blunt-tipped needle
- Scissors
- Knee-high nylons or legs cut from pantyhose
- Cotton string or acrylic yarn to secure wool balls in nylon stocking

Note: 100% Worsted Wool is good. Roving Wool is thicker, lightly spun, and felts very well. Do Not Use synthetic yarns with acrylic or blends or wool that is labeled "machine washable" or "superwash." They Will Not Felt.



How-To make felted wool dryer balls: (Ideal to use 4-7 per load)

TIP: Pull wool from skein while working (don't cut yards off).

1. Wrap yarn around your first two fingers 10-12 times.
2. Pinch wrapped yarn in the middle, remove fingers, wrap 5-6 times around the middle bundle.
3. Wrap yarn tightly around the entire bundle, turning the ball to cover all sides. Continue wrapping tightly to reach your preferred size. Tennis ball size saves yarn; bigger size cuts drying time.
4. Use a crochet hook or blunt-tipped yarn needle to pull end of yarn under several layers in yarn ball, repeat from different direction, then pull yarn out and cut the end.
5. Using pantyhose legs or knee-high nylons, put a yarn ball in the toe, twist and tie the nylon with string or cotton/acrylic yarn to separate, add another ball, tie, and repeat.

Felting the Dryer Balls:

Toss the yarn caterpillar in with towels using a hot wash cycle with a cold-water rinse. Then dry with towels on the hottest setting. To test, remove the end ball from the nylon when dry and gently scrape over the ball to see if strands separate. If they stay intact and the surface is smooth, it's felted. If not, repeat the washing and drying cycles.

Attendees will enjoy connecting with nearly 100 vendors and learning more about the wide variety of environmental initiatives, programs, and perspectives in our region. Folks should expect to learn something new and be inspired to take active roles in promoting sustainability and community resilience in their daily lives!

The Expo is meant to serve as a platform for networking, learning, and collaboration. Every aspect of the event is designed to encourage individuals to take active roles in promoting sustainability and resilience in their communities. Green Recipe Revisited: Spicy Red Thai Curry Using Bits and Ends

In Tacoma there are many amazing options for local seasonal foods. Despite this bounty, food is one of the most abundant things that ends up in the landfill. Jennifer Johnson from Happy Belly Eatery & Juice Bar was featured on Urban Green where she shared a delicious curry recipe made up of bits and ends that typically goes to waste.

Liquids and Spices:

Mix together in a large cooking pot before adding vegetables.

- 1.5 cups coconut milk
- 3/4 cup water
- 2 tsp powdered vegetable stock
- 1/4 cup peanut butter
- 1 tbsp red curry paste
- 2 tsp garlic puree
- 1 tsp ginger paste
- 3 tsp curry powder
- 2 tsp sea salt
- 1/4 cup chopped unsalted peanuts

Vegetables:

Add to liquids and spices mixture. Reserve edible trimmings from cut vegetables.

- 2.5 cups carrot (sliced)
- 1/4 cup jalapeños (fine dice)
- 1 cup water chestnuts (roughly cut)
- 1 cup onion (diced)
- 1/2 cup green onion (dice white part of onion and retain green part for garnish)
- 4 cups red bell pepper (2 cups reserved for blending)

Cooking:

Stir mixture frequently while cooking for 1 to 1.5 hours on medium to medium-high heat.

Final Blending Process:

Once curry is cooked, use a slotted spoon and put 2 cups of curry vegetable chunks into blender with reserved 2 cups red bell pepper and any vegetables trimmings (onion bits, carrot peels, etc.) with 1 cup liquid curry sauce from cooking pot. Blend until semi-smooth (30 - 60 seconds). Add blended mixture back to curry pot and stir well to incorporate.

Serve over fresh spinach and one 8 oz scoop of brown rice or preferred cooked grain and garnish with peanuts and green onion.

Tackling Food Waste: A Sustainable Step for Tacoma

Food waste is a persistent yet often underestimated issue with far-reaching consequences that extend beyond our plates. The average family of four spends around \$1,600 annually on food that ends up in the trash. Every year, billions of dollars are wasted on food that goes uneaten in America. Beyond the financial aspect, wasted food puts an unnecessary strain on natural resources and contributes to climate change – with nearly 25% of our shared methane emissions coming from wasted food that ends up in a landfill.



The City of Tacoma understands the importance of tackling this issue head-on. Together, we can work to both reduce avoidable food waste, and handle unavoidable food waste responsibly. Avoidable waste includes edible food that is discarded, like leftovers or expired items.

Unavoidable waste consists of inedible parts such as eggshells, bones, and coffee grounds. Unavoidable waste can be responsibly disposed of in an in-sink grinder (or garbage disposal) or by being placed in your Solid Waste Management brown food and yard waste bin.

Avoidable food waste can be reduced by making smart shopping, cooking, and eating choices at home. Plan to make sure you have the appropriate ingredients on-hand for weekly meals. Shop your fridge, freezer, and pantry to see what you already have before buying new. Freezing extra portions for a future meal and tidying your refrigerator regularly can also help reduce the amount of avoidable food waste that ends up in a landfill.

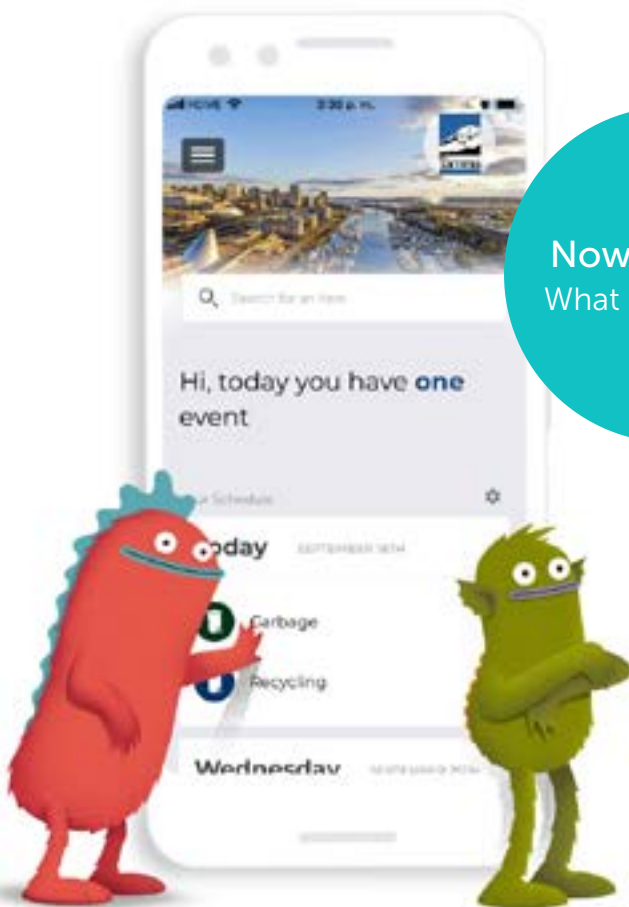

Guiding Tacoma's Environmental Future: The Environmental Services & Sustainable Tacoma Commissions



The City of Tacoma relies on the support and guidance of over 30 committees, boards, and commissions that make recommendations to City leadership on issues that impact our community. The Environmental Services Department works closely with two – the Environmental Services Commission and the Sustainable Tacoma Commission. Although each operates with unique goals in mind, they both positively impact the City through community engagement, environmental stewardship, and effective governance.

The Environmental Services Commission (ESC) plays a pivotal role in shaping the City's approach to waste and resource management. Charged with reviewing and offering recommendations on wastewater, stormwater, and solid waste rates, the ESC represents a diverse cross-section of Tacoma's stakeholders. With members from business, regulatory, residential, and governmental backgrounds, the ESC ensures that the City's environmental policies are comprehensive, balanced, and reflective of various perspectives. The commission has 13 voting members and two ex-officio non-voting members, all appointed by the City Manager.

The Sustainable Tacoma Commission ensures transparency and accountability for implementation of the 2030 Climate Action Plan. By coordinating and communicating initiatives aligned with the City's vision, the commission bridges the gap between administration and residents, making sustainability a shared endeavor. The Sustainable Tacoma Commission consists of 13 members who are appointed by the Mayor and City Council.

Both commissions underline the City's dedication to community collaboration. The relationship between the City and residents is vital for equitable utility rates, programs, and engagement efforts. Together, these commissions establish a framework for Tacoma's environmental future. The expertise, community input, and visionary leadership that these commissions provide helps drive progress towards an environmentally and economically responsible future.

The Environmental Services Commission meets on the second Thursday of each month at 4 p.m., both virtually and in-person, at the Center for Urban Waters at 326 East D Street. The Sustainable Tacoma Commission meets on the third Thursday of each month at 5 p.m., both virtually and in-person, at the Tacoma Municipal Building at 747 Market Street.

Members of the public are welcome to attend either in-person or virtually each month. Visit cityoftacoma.org/STC or cityoftacoma.org/ESC for more information and opportunities to apply to serve on either commission.

Environmental Services Receives an Excellence in Management Award

This award, along with other recent national recognitions, supports this belief and is also a way to recognize the outstanding work of employees at all levels of the organization.

Call-2-Haul Services are Available to Residential Customers

Residential Solid Waste Services customers receive two Call-2-Haul services per year. The service is redeemable by calling Solid Waste at (253) 502-2100 to schedule your curbside pickup of up to three large items like couches, ovens or exercise equipment and up to 15 boxes or bags of small items like lawn chairs, broken toys or small household appliances. Grease Goes in the Garbage

Forty percent of all sewage blockages in Tacoma are caused by grease clogs. That's why it's important to remember that cooking grease should never go down the kitchen sink. Avoid messy, expensive backups and damage to pipes by placing cooking grease in a jar or bottle and allowing it to solidify before putting it in the trash. Up to 10 gallons of liquid grease (from residential sources) can be disposed of per visit at the Household Hazardous Waste facility at (3510 S. Mullen St.) Learn about the proper disposal of household grease at cityoftacoma.org/grease or call (253) 591-5418.

Air Freshener

Ingredients:

1 cotton ball
Pure vanilla extract (not imitation)
Small jar, dish or bowl

Put the cotton ball into the container and soak thoroughly in the pure vanilla extract. Place the container behind a plant or picture frame.
